

Offices of Senator Ben Cardin and Senator Chris Van Hollen (D-MD) 1/25/24

What is an Earmark?

- One-time grant funding for local community projects
- Only nonprofit entities and units of local government are eligible
- Funding comes from existing federal grant program authorities



Senate

- No limit on number of requests per office
- Some accounts differ from House
- Letters of support required by office

House

- 15 requests per office
- Some accounts differ from Senate
- Two letters of support required for each request by committee

Note that deadlines may be different for House and Senate

FY25 Senate Earmark Consideration Timeline

1. President Biden releases the FY25 budget officially starting the Appropriations process, typically in mid- spring.

2. Nonprofits and local governments submit requests to their Senators and House member shortly after the release of the FY25 budget.

3. Senators Cardin and Van Hollen select projects to advance to the Senate Appropriations Committee

4. Senate Appropriations reviews the submitted requests, typically in early summer

5. Senate Appropriations releases funding bills with earmarks that were selected, typically in the summer.

6. House and Senate vote on their appropriations bills and conference them together throughout the fall.

7. Consolidated funding bill is agreed on by Congress and signed into law with Senate and House earmarks, typically in late December

8. Earmark funding is distributed by federal agencies, likely in spring 2025.



Tips for a Strong Application

Reach out to both your Senate and House Delegation members to maximize our ability to support you If seeking letters of support from state legislators, start early to avoid the height of the General Assembly session

Explain clearly how your project advances equity and addresses unmet community needs

If requesting multiple projects, provide a ranked priority list

Communicate with delegation staff throughout process, including project idea development

Include any information on the scalability of your project, especially for large requests

If relevant, consider inviting field staff to visit your project to learn more about your needs

Explain how your project will become self-sustaining without the need for further earmark funding

Coordinating with State Agencies



For accounts with state agency approval requirements, start outreach <u>early</u>



Before applying for earmark funds, discuss with the relevant state or federal agency the <u>cost-share requirements</u> and possible <u>administrative costs</u> associated with your proposed project.



Most transportation projects that are not in the CTP or STIP require a <u>letter from MDOT</u> confirming that, should your project be funded, MDOT will amend the STIP to include your project.

Sample Project & Application:

Project Purpose

Funds will support construction of a facility in the Shaw neighborhood in Baltimore City with a commercial kitchen and food pantry, afterschool tutoring, and job training to serve local families. The Shaw Community has experienced major disinvestment, which is part of the reason for the family poverty and lack of growth.

Justification of Request

This funding would enable construction of a larger food pantry facility to distribute healthy food to residents of Shaw without adding to their household budgets. The median household income in this area is \$34,041, compared to the City median of \$52,318. The City Health Department, in a study with Johns Hopkins Public Health, determined that this neighborhood was one of the poorest in the City and considered to be a Healthy Food Priority Area for increasing access to healthy foods. The funds being requested are needed to subsidize the costs of constructing a state-of-the- art food pantry and community center that will support the overall transformation of this community.
